The Houston Rockets Should Make the Playoffs



or the last few months, I have said on the radio, on TheHRR.com

website and for anyone willing to listen, the Houston Rockets will not make the playoffs this season. A few friends and colleagues agree with me while others disagree with me. One question the naysayers ask me is: "If the Rockets don't make the playoffs under Van Gundy, then why did Les get rid of Rudy?" Good question. Yao Ming will provide the low post offense; however, the physical defense on the Rockets is sorely lacking. Name the Rockets best, and most physical, defensive player. The answer: Kelvin **Cato**. For all of the verbal assaults fans and the media hailed at Cato the past few seasons, Kelvin has become a solid front court player over the last season. The second best defender is probably Jim Jackson then swingman Adrian Griffin. Where's Steve and Yao?

Steve is a poor defender. Period. Steve's on the ball defense still needs a lot of work despite the fact he's entering his 5th season in the NBA. Yao Ming can become a good defender; but, I don't see him becoming a dominating presence in the paint.
